L'inconnue de la Seine Sacheverell Sitwell,1950 After Blanchot Leslie Hill, Brian Nelson, Dimitris Vardoulakis, 2005 What does it mean to come after Blanchot Three things at least First it is to recognise that it is no longer possible to believe in an essentialist determination of literary discourse or of aesthetic experience All this has disappeared and there is no way back Second there is the question of history What is Blanchot's legacy to us his readers Any name however irreplaceably singular is always already preceded limited challenged even by the abiding anonymity of the person animal or thing it claims to name Every name is necessarily impersonal anonymous other Blanchot after Blanchot then can best be understood in the sense of that which is according to Blanchot and that is nothing other than the infinite process of reading and rereading Blanchot without end Here a third meaning to the phrase after Blanchot comes into view For if we come after Blanchot it is surely because Blanchot is still before us still in front still in the future still to come The Drowned Muse Anne-Gaëlle Saliot, 2015 The Drowned Muse is a study of the extraordinary destiny in the history of European culture of an object which could seem at first glance quite ordinary in the history of European culture It tells the story of a mask the cast of a young girl s face entitled L Inconnue de la Seine the Unknown Woman of the Seine and its subsequent metamorphoses as a cultural figure Legend has it that the Inconnue drowned herself in Paris at the end of the nineteenth century The forensic scientist tending to her unidentified corpse at the Paris Morgue was supposedly so struck by her allure that he captured in plaster the contours of her face This unknown girl also called The Mona Lisa of Suicide has since become the object of an obsessive interest that started in the late 1890s reached its peak in the 1930s and continues to reverberate today Aby Warburg defines art history as a ghost story for grown ups This study is simlarly a ghost story for grown ups narrating the aura of a cultural object that crosses temporal geographical and linguistic frontiers It views the Inconnue as a symptomatic expression of a modern world haunted by the earlier modernity of the nineteenth century It also investigates how the mask s metamorphoses reflect major shifts in the cultural history of the last two centuries approaching the Iconnue as an entry point to understand a phenomenon characteristic of 20th and 21st century modernity the translatability of media Doing so this study mobilizes discourses surrounding the Inconnue casting them as points of negotiation through which we may consider the modern age
