2.1 Read the passage below and answer the questions that follow.

Peat lands are special wetlands that play a very important role in ecology. A peat land, of approximately 5 000 years old, near Mufurang is almost destroyed because of excessive extraction of water from the nearby Malopo river. The water is extracted for human consumption.

Peat lands like the one near Malling is exceptional and play an important role in storing water as well as preventing climate changes.

Dr. Pat-Louis Drunding said that carbon that is "held" or "stored" by peat lands combats climate change because it decreases the amount of carbon in the atmosphere.

Peat lands trap about one third of the world's carbon. Approximately 50% of wetlands worldwide are peat lands. However in South Africa about 10% of the wetlands are peat lands.

Grundling explained that peat lands can hold about 1 000 times its own mass in water. This replenishes the water table and is the source that keeps streams flowing. The "sponge effect" of the peat also makes it possible to store water that is then released during the seasons.

Dr. Grunwald said that it might be too late to restore the peat land near Malling, but it might be possible to restore some parts of it if more water is supplied to this peat land.

The result of this destruction is depletion of the water table. The habitat of numerous fish and bird species that lived in the canal bed was also destroyed.
