

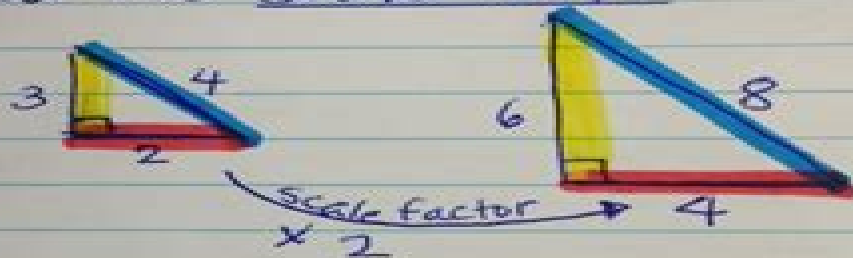
# Similar Figures

## Characteristics:

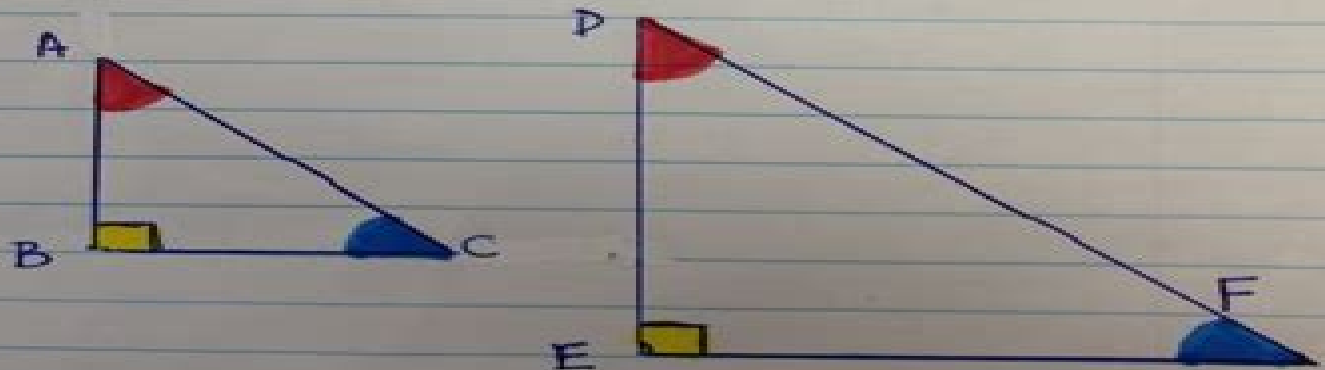
1. Same shape but different size
