increasing In contrast while relatively few twelfth grade students have ever been good at factoring trinomials performance on this skill seems to be decreasing This suggests that while more students are completing advanced mathematics courses in high school these courses are not helping in the area of factoring trinomials Finally there are limitations to using NAEP as a measure of student performance on the Common Core State Standards To the extent that NAEP can be used however the NAEP data show a substantial gap between expectations and performance
