This study critically examines the current state of Synoptic Gospel studies, particularly many scholars' reliance on the Literary Dependence Hypothesis, and endeavors to advance a more balanced approach. The author attempts to deduce the Synoptic Gospels construction process by meticulously examining the Eucharist and its context within these Gospels by employing a model of Mode Register Analysis based on Systemic Functional Linguistics. This study uncovers the probability that each designated text in the Synoptic Gospels was constructed based on oral Gospel tradition(s) under the influence of each constructor's identity.

The Negative Existential Cycle Ljuba Veselinova, Arja Hamari, 2022-12-20. In 1991, William Croft suggested that negative existentials, typically lexical expressions that mean 'not exist', 'not have', are one possible source for negation markers and gave his hypothesis the name Negative Existential Cycle (NEC). It is a variationist model based on cross-linguistic data. For a good twenty years following its formulation, it was cited at face value without ever having been tested by historical comparative data. Over the last decade, Ljuba Veselinova has worked on testing the model in a comparative perspective, and this edited volume further expands on her work. The collection presented here features detailed studies of several language families such as Bantu, Chadic, and Indo-European. A number of articles focus on the micro-variation and attested historical developments within smaller groups and clusters such as Arabic, Mandarin, and Cantonese, and Nanaic. Finally, variation and historical developments in specific languages are discussed for Ancient Hebrew, Ancient Egyptian, Moksha, Mordvin, Uralic, Bashkir, Turkic, Kalmyk, Mongolic, three Pama-Nyungan languages, Odam, Southern Uto-Aztecan, and Tacana, Takanan, Amazonian, and Bolivia. The book is concluded by two chapters devoted to modeling cyclical processes in language change from different

theoretical perspectives Key notions discussed throughout the book include affirmative and negative existential constructions the expansion of the latter into verbal negation and subsequently from more specific to more general markers of negation Nominalizations as well as the uses of negative existentials as standalone negative answers figure among the most frequent pathways whereby negative existentials evolve as general negation markers The operation of the Negative Existential Cycle appears partly genealogically conditioned as the cycle is found to iterate regularly within some families but never starts in others as is the case in Bantu In addition other special negation markers such as nominal negators are found to undergo similar processes i e they expand into the verbal domain and thereby develop into more general negation markers The book provides rich information on a specific path of the evolution of negation on cyclical processes in language change and it shows cases the historical comparative method in a modern setting

Morphological and Syntactical Irregularities in the Book of Revelation Laurențiu Moț, 2015-03-31 Morphological and Syntactical Irregularities in the Book of Revelation by Laurențiu Florentin Moț is an approach to the solecisms of Johannine Apocalypse from a Greek perspective The work aims at demonstrating that in accord with Second Language Acquisition studies Semitic transfer in Revelation is extremely rare Most of its linguistic peculiarities can be explained within the context of the Greek language Morphological and Syntactical Irregularities in the Book of Revelation is unique in several ways First it deals with the most comprehensive list of solecisms Second it treats grammatical irregularities in their own right looking at their cause explanation and contribution to the interpretation of the text Third it is interdisciplinary bringing together textual criticism Greek linguistics and NT exegesis

The Morphosyntax of Negative Markers Karen De Clercq, 2020-06-08 This book applies the tools of nanosyntax to the natural language phenomenon of negation Most work on negation is concerned with the study of sentence negation while low scope negation or constituent negation is hardly ever systematically discussed in the literature The present book aims to fill that gap by investigating scopally different negative markers in a sample of 23 typologically diverse languages A four way classification of negative markers is argued for and it is shown how meaningful syncretism patterns arise across those four groups of negative markers in the language sample investigated The syncretisms are meaningful in that they track the natural semantic scope of negation and provide support to the idea that morphology is not arbitrary but points to submorphemic structure Consequently this study leads to a decomposition of the negative morpheme into five privative features Tense Focus Classification Quantity and Negation proper Finally the book argues that sentence constituent and lexical negation can all be treated in the same module of the grammar i e syntax

between Western Christendom and the Orthodox and Islamic East Ruled by Venice in her Stato da Mar sea empire the islands became an independent state as the Septinsular Republic and then under British Protection as the United States of the Ionian Islands Before the mainland Greeks had a State the Ionian people were proud of having a university from 1824 in Corfu town a World Heritage Site The islands were united with the Kingdom of Greece in 1864 the first addition to its territory This book with over thirty illustrations explores the history archaeology languages customs and culture of the Ionian Islands Without venturing far from the islands readers will learn much about this distinctive part of the Mediterranean and Greek world The chapters range from the mythology of the Bronze Age Homer s Scheria where Odysseus startled Nausicaa as she bathed to today concentrating particularly on the British Protectorate 1815 1864 One illustrated by contemporary maps deals with descriptions of the islands by a fourteenth century Venetian writing in Latin The roles of Jews Souliot refugees Greek revolutionaries rebel peasants in Cephalonia and workers in Corfu s port suburb of Mandouki are examined in detail There are contributions on religion and philosophy as well as literature music painting and the folk art of carved walking canes
