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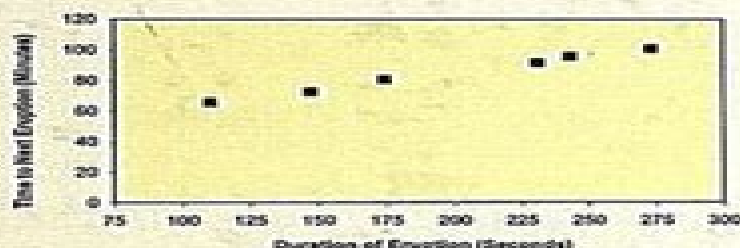

Visitors to Yellowstone National Park want to see an eruption of the famous geyser, Old Faithful, and many people mistakenly believe that it erupts every hour. Although Old Faithful doesn't erupt on a fixed schedule, there do seem to be patterns in its eruptions. The following plot shows data from selected Old Faithful eruptions in January, 2003.

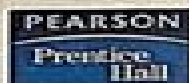

We can make several observations about this graph. First, the graph represents a function with the duration of an eruption as input, and the time to the next eruption as output. Second, the function is increasing; as the duration of the eruption increases, so does the time to the next eruption. Finally, the points in this scatter plot lie approximately on a (straight) line.

Since the time required to wait for the next eruption is what visitors want to know, it would be useful to determine a function rule that would enable us to make such a prediction, based on how long the last eruption took. How to do this for Old Faithful is discussed in Chapter 2 of this book. This application, together with many others like it throughout the book, illustrates a central feature of mathematical modeling—finding and applying appropriate mathematical functions to describe and understand real-world situations.

*Elementary Mathematical Models* offers instructors an alternative to standard college algebra quantitative literacy and liberal arts mathematics courses. Presuming only a background of exposure to high school algebra, the text introduces students to the methodology of mathematical modeling which plays a role in nearly all real applications of mathematics. A course based on this text would have as its primary goal preparing students to be competent consumers of mathematical modeling in their future studies. Such a course would also provide students with an understanding of the modeling process and a facility with much of the standard non trigonometric content of college algebra and precalculus. This book builds successively a series of growth models defined in terms of simple recursive patterns of change corresponding to arithmetic, quadratic, geometric, and logistic growth. Students discover and come to understand linear, polynomial, exponential, and logarithmic functions in the context of analyzing these models of intrinsically and scientifically interesting phenomena including polar ice extent, antibiotic resistance, and viral internet videos. Students gain a deep appreciation for the power and limitations of mathematical modeling in the physical life and social sciences as questions of modeling methodology are carefully and constantly addressed. Realistic examples are used consistently throughout the text and every topic is illustrated with models that are constructed from and compared to real data. The text is extremely attractive and the exposition is extraordinarily clear. The lead author of this text is the recipient of nine MAA awards for expository writing including the Ford Evans P.lya and Allendoerfer awards and the Beckenbach Book prize. Teaching Statistics Using Baseball is a collection of case studies and exercises applying statistical and probabilistic thinking to the game of baseball Baseball is the most statistical of all sports since players are identified and evaluated by their corresponding hitting and pitching statistics There is an active effort by people in the baseball community to learn more about baseball performance and strategy by the use of statistics This book illustrates basic methods of data analysis and

probability models by means of baseball statistics collected on players and teams Students often have difficulty learning statistics ideas since they are explained using examples that are foreign to the students The idea of the book is to describe statistical thinking in a context that is baseball that will be familiar and interesting to students The book is organized using a same structure as most introductory statistics texts There are chapters on the analysis on a single batch of data followed with chapters on comparing batches of data and relationships There are chapters on probability models and on statistical inference The book can be used as the framework for a one semester introductory statistics class focused on baseball or sports This type of class has been taught at Bowling Green State University It may be very suitable for a statistics class for students with sports related majors such as sports management or sports medicine Alternately the book can be used as a resource for instructors who wish to infuse their present course in probability or statistics with applications from baseball The second edition of Teaching Statistics follows the same structure as the first edition where the case studies and exercises have been replaced by modern players and teams and the new types of baseball data from the PitchFX system and fangraphs com are incorporated into the text
