Shepherds and Butchers Chris Marnewick, 2011-05-13 Leon Labuschagne's livelihood depends on death At nineteen he is a warder on Death Row a shepherd who cares for the condemned and a butcher who escorts them to the gallows After a gruelling two week stint in which thirty two men were hanged Leon loses control with tragic results And now he's the one facing the death penalty Only the most precarious line of legal argument stands between Leon and the gallows Chasing a defence his advocate trawls the deepest recesses of life in the Pot the twilight world of Death Row A gripping courtroom drama steeped in the factual *Shepherds Butchers* begins in 1987 a year in which 164 people were executed Two years later the last man went to the gallows in Pretoria after more than four thousand hangings that century The novel portrays legal execution in unprecedented detail revealing its devastating impact on all those involved

*Choice Not Fate The Life and Times of Trevor Manuel* Pippa Green, 2012-10-09 Trevor Manuel became South Africa's first black finance minister in 1996 a time when the economy threatened to spiral into a debt trap It took five years before Manuel could present his first good news Budget in Parliament He described that Budget as a tale of irrevocable and powerful transformation a tale of patience and obstinacy of determination and hope Of choice not fate He could have been telling the tale of his own life Born into a working class family on the Cape Flats his family's story embodied the fate that befell thousands of people classified coloured under apartheid Homes lived in and lost under the cruel Group Areas Act a mother who struggled to bring up her children on a garment worker's wages clashes with gangsters who roamed the streets of the Flats a truncated education Manuel stared down fate and internecine Western Cape politics to become one of the most prominent anti apartheid leaders in the internal resistance movement of the 1980s He confronted apartheid's police and prisons with a boldness that sometimes bordered on recklessness After Nelson Mandela was released from prison in 1990 Manuel rose quickly through the ranks of the African National Congress becoming a member of Mandela's first cabinet When Mandela appointed him minister of finance in 1996 business leaders sneered at his lack of qualifications and experience When he drove through a tough macroeconomic plan in a post apartheid South Africa some of his own constituency turned on him Obstinate and patient he saw out the worst until the economy began to turn Under his

stewardship South Africa entered its longest growth period ever By 2007 he was the world's longest serving minister of finance and across the world the most respected African finance minister

**The Prison Letters of Nelson Mandela** Nelson

Mandela, 2018-07-10 One of NPR's Great Reads of 2018 An unforgettable portrait of one of the most inspiring historical figures of the twentieth century published on the centenary of his birth Arrested in 1962 as South Africa's apartheid regime intensified its brutal campaign against political opponents forty four year old lawyer and African National Congress activist Nelson Mandela had no idea that he would spend the next twenty seven years in jail During his 10 052 days of incarceration the future leader of South Africa wrote a multitude of letters to unyielding prison authorities fellow activists government officials and most memorably to his courageous wife Winnie and his five children Now 255 of these letters many of which have never been published provide exceptional insight into how Mandela maintained his inner spirits while living in almost complete isolation and how he engaged with an outside world that became increasingly outraged by his plight Organized chronologically and divided by the four venues in which he was held as a sentenced prisoner The Prison Letters of Nelson Mandela begins in Pretoria Local Prison where Mandela was held following his 1962 trial In 1964 Mandela was taken to Robben Island Prison where a stark existence was lightened only by visits and letters from family After eighteen years Mandela was transferred to Pollsmoor Prison a large complex outside of Cape Town with beds and better food but where he and four of his comrades were confined to a rooftop cell apart from the rest of the prison population Finally Mandela was taken to Victor Verster Prison in 1988 where he was held until his release on February 11 1990 With accompanying facsimiles of some of his actual letters this landmark volume reveals how Mandela a lawyer by training advocated for prisoners human rights It reveals him to be a loving father who wrote to his daughter I sometimes wish science could invent

miracles and make my daughter get her missing birthday cards and have the pleasure of knowing that her Pa loves her aware that photos and letters he sent had simply disappeared More painful still are the letters written in 1969 when Mandela forbidden from attending the funerals of his mother and his son Thembi was reduced to consoling family members through correspondence Yet what emerges most powerfully is Mandela s unfaltering optimism Honour belongs to those who never forsake the truth even when things seem dark grim who try over and over again who are never discouraged by insults humiliation even defeat Whether providing unwavering support to his also imprisoned wife or outlining a human rights philosophy that resonates today The Prison Letters of Nelson Mandela reveals the heroism of a man who refused to compromise his moral values in the face of extraordinary punishment Ultimately these letters position Mandela as one of the most inspiring figures of the twentieth century From The Prison Letters of Nelson Mandela A new world will be won not by those who stand at a distance with their arms folded but by those who are in the arena whose garments are torn by storms whose bodies are maimed in the course of contest I am convinced that floods of personal disaster can never drown a determined revolutionary nor can the cumulus of misery that accompanies tragedy suffocate him My respect for human beings is based not on the colour of a man s skin nor authority he may wield but purely on merit A good pen can also remind us of the happiest moments in our lives bring noble ideas into our dens our blood our souls It can turn tragedy into hope victory
