

Ten Principles of Good Prescribing



In modern healthcare, prescribing is the main way to treat and prevent disease. While medicines can enhance health, they all have the potential to cause harm if used inappropriately. We recommend that healthcare professionals who prescribe medicines should follow these ten principles, which underpin safe and effective use of medicines.

All prescribers should:

Be clear about the reasons for prescribing

Establish an accurate diagnosis whenever possible (although this may often be difficult)

Be clear about how the patient is likely to benefit from the prescribed medicines 2 Take into account the patient's medication history before prescribing

Obtain an accurate list of current and recent medications (including over the counter and atternative medicines), prior adverse drug reactions and drug allergies from the patient, their carers, or colleagues

Take into account other factors that might alter the benefits and risks of treatment

Consider other individual factors that might influence the prescription (for example, physiological changes with age and pregnancy, or impaired kidney, liver, or heart function) Take into account the patient's ideas, concerns, and expectations

Aim to form a partnership with the patient when selecting treatments, making sure that they understand and agree with the reasons for taking the medicine
