



since banned that contained a hidden and decidedly hostile acrostic in which the challenge was not only to convey the original meaning but also to preserve the disguise of the original meaning in the Chinese text The translation appeared in The New York Times He also offers a wry typology of translators comparing them metaphorically and paronomastically to different species of birds in a concluding coda he excavates the place names in bicultural and multilingual Hong Kong uncovering not only translations and transliterations but also heteronyms different names for the same place as well as remarkably phononyms names where the pronunciation of a word in one language happens to coincide with a word in another language with the same meaning The result is a provocative potpourri of fascinating insights into the cultural and semiotic complexities of translation that will surely interest students of translation literature linguistics and history as well as the informed general reader
