# GUIDED PRACTICE

Duchesne et al. (2013, p. 90) define guided practice as "support provided to enable students to participate in expert activities in increasingly expert ways."

### DEFINITION

Guided practice is a teaching practice pioneered by Barbara Rogoff. It involves three steps for practicing new skills in the classroom. First, the teacher models how to do a task to the student. Second, the student does the task with guidance from the teacher. Third, the student practices the task independently.

### EXAMPLE

The I Do, We Do, You Do method is an example of guided practice. This is a three-step model:

- I Do: The teacher models the task
- We Do: The teacher and students do the task collaboratively
- You Do: The student graduates to doing the task independently.
