Given that a large subset of this percentage is composed of immigrants, many of whom do not speak English or who have learned English as a second language, special considerations for effective psychological assessment are necessary. This book fills a gap in the scientific literature by consolidating the research on psychological assessment with Hispanic samples into one comprehensive volume and providing simple recommendations for the psychological assessment of Hispanic clients. An exploration of the general psychological assessment domains (e.g., personality, intelligence) is included with references to research on the major assessment measures used in the field.
