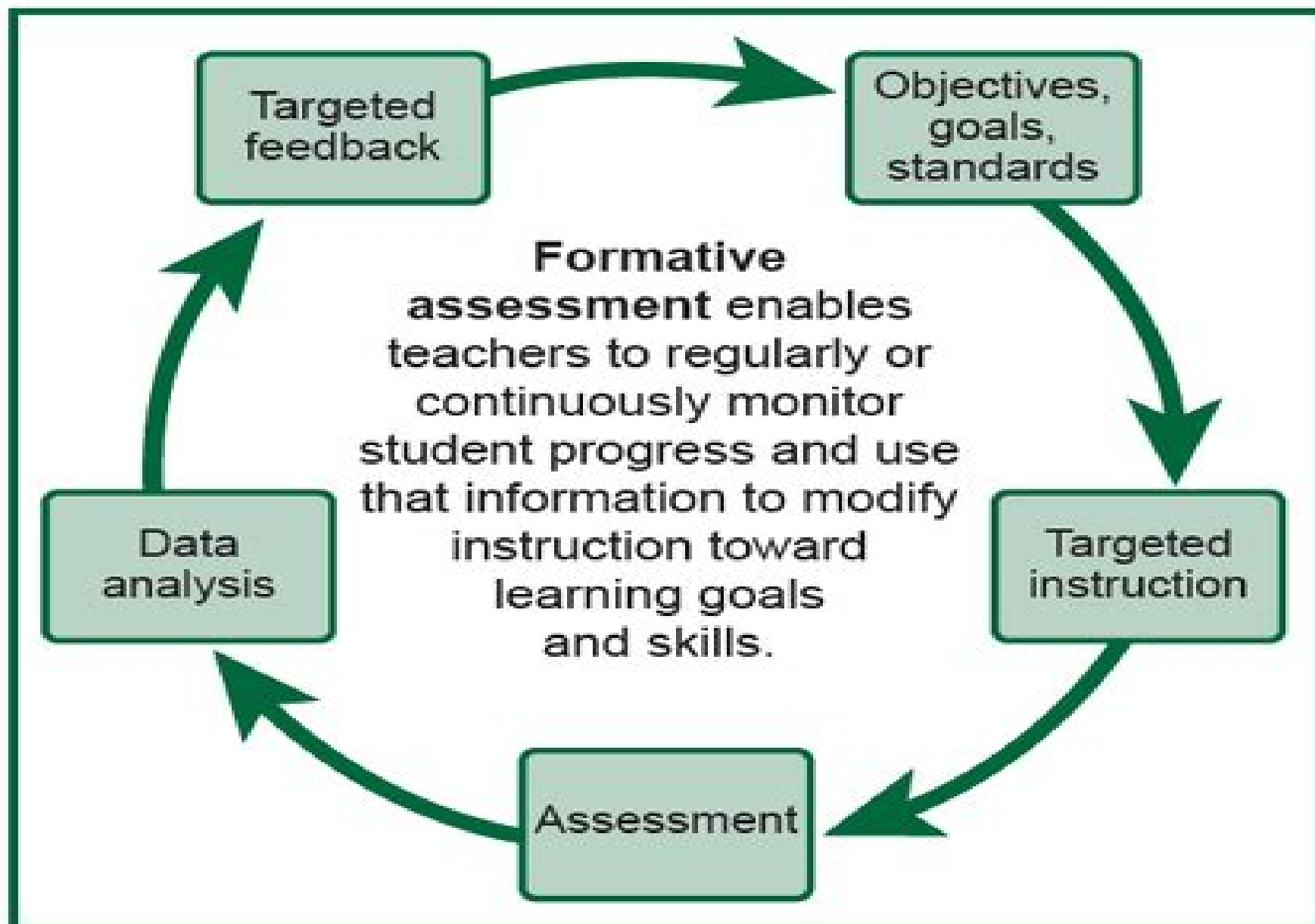


Figure 3.1. The formative assessment cycle
