

TENSIONS BETWEEN ALLIES [COLD WAR]

- Russia = political leaders & royal flee out of / from others = enables radical Russian leaders to **RUSSIAN REVOLUTION 1917** to cause re-established Russia as first communist state
- Revolution = destruction of royal family & upper class **(KILL)** = tsar (emperor) & family executed
- **Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR) 1922** = declared after civil war to **RED RUSSIA** (communists) and **WHITE RUSSIA** (higher class = British, France & USA) = established as **HOME OF REVOLUTIONARY MOVEMENTS**
- **WWII 1939** USSR = dictatorship (due to suppression of all opposition)
- Soviet Union WWII = Britain, France & USA (important to defeat Nazi-Germany) = **ALLIED POWERS**
- **AFTER WAR** = capitalist-communist tension
