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Lucien Febvre lecteur et critique Bertrand Müller, 2014-04-01 Lucien Febvre a dominé l'historiographie de son temps et son œuvre demeure exceptionnelle plus d'un titre. Tout autant que ses livres souvent rédigés ses comptes rendus témoignent de ses combats pour et dans l'histoire. Lecteur exceptionnel qui rien d'important n'échappait, Lucien Febvre fut un critique remarquable, implacable et redouté. Ce travail de recension représente quotidiennement pendant près de deux ans une partie du cours duquel il a rendu compte de près de deux mille ouvrages, reflétant un militantisme pour une autre histoire ainsi qu'un engagement dans son temps. Confronté au monde en crise, crise de la civilisation occidentale du progressisme et de la science, Lucien Febvre s'est efforcé par le moyen de la critique de définir une ligne de conduite susceptible de fonder sa responsabilité d'historien comme savant et comme citoyen. Ce travail militant représente pour lui le meilleur moyen de multiplier les projets d'orienter la recherche et d'expérimenter de nouveaux chantiers pour l'histoire et les sciences sociales. Les multiples dimensions de cet engagement forment le cœur de ce livre, qui n'est pas une biographie mais bien plutôt une genalogie d'un savoir faire. Avec une rigueur et une ampleur de vue remarquables, Bertrand Müller propose une réflexion originale sur la notion d'œuvre, les contextes historiques et la construction du récit en histoire.

An Analysis of Lucien Febvre's The Problem of Unbelief in the 16th Century Joseph Tendler, 2018-02-21. Febvre posa cette question centrale dans "The Problem of Unbelief in the 16th Century". Il demanda : "Comment les gens de la sixième siècle pouvaient-ils croire en Dieu et en l'Église alors que les idées religieuses étaient celles de l'Église ?" La réponse informa un débat plus large sur l'histoire moderne, particulièrement l'histoire française. Did the religious attitudes of the Enlightenment and the twentieth century, notably secularism and atheism, first take root in the sixteenth century? Could the spirit of scientific and rational inquiry of the twentieth century have begun with the rejection of God and Christianity by men such as Rabelais, writing in his allegorical novel Gargantua and Pantagruel, the work most often cited as a proto-atheist text prior to Febvre's study? The debate hinged on some key differences of interpretation. Was Rabelais mocking the structures of the Christian Church in which case he might be anticlerical? Was he mocking the Bible scriptures or Church doctrines in which case he might be anti-Christian? Or was he mocking the very idea of God's existence in which case he might be an atheist? The other great contribution that Febvre made to the study of history can be found not so much in the fine detail of this work as in the additions that he made to the historian's toolkit. In this sense, Febvre was highly creative; indeed, it can be argued that he ranks among the most creative of all historians. He sought to move the study of history itself beyond its traditional focus on documentary records, arguing instead that close analysis of language could open up a gateway into the ways in which people actually thought and to their subconscious minds. This concept, the focus on mentalités, is central to the hugely influential approach of the Annales group of historians, and it enabled a switch in the focus of much historical inquiry away from the study of élites and their deeds and towards new forms of broader social history. Febvre also used techniques and models drawn from anthropology and sociology to create new ways of framing and answering questions.

Wissenschaft und Praxis Christian Bonnet, Elisabeth Nemeth, 2015-11-24 Die Wissenschaftsphilosophie des französischen 20. Jahrhunderts ist reichhaltiger und differenzierter in ihren Standpunkten als lange vermutet. Die Autoren zeigen das anhand der nur teilweise erforschten Interaktion zwischen den Wissenschaftsphilosophen des deutschen und französischen Sprachraums. Das Buch liefert neue Erkenntnisse zur Rolle der Philosophiekongresse in Prag 1934 und Paris 1937 sowie zur Bedeutung einzelner Akteure wie Marcel Boll, der die Rezeption des Logischen Empirismus in Frankreich befürderte. Die Spuren, die Ernst Mach aber auch der weniger bekannte deutsche Physiologe und Hirnforscher Ewald Hering in der französischen Wissenschaftsphilosophie hinterließen, verfolgen die Autoren bis hin zu den Ideen Jean Piagets. Im Mittelpunkt des Buchs stehen Philosophen aus Frankreich, Deutschland und Österreich und ihre Leistung, die Wissenschaften nicht nur erkenntnistheoretisch und logisch durchleuchtet sondern auch erkannt zu haben, dass ihre theoretische Struktur nur dann vollständig erfasst werden kann, wenn ihre praktische Dimension mit einbezogen wird. Darunter steht Henri Poincaré, der die tragende Rolle der Konventionen für die Theoriebildung in der Mathematik herausstellte. Sichtbar wird der Bezug zur Praxis auch in Moritz Schlicks Berlegungen zu einer auf Empirie basierenden Ethik oder in der Arbeit Otto Neuraths, der eine aus den modernen Wissenschaften gewonnene Konzeption menschlichen Erkennens für das Projekt der gesellschaftlichen Aufklärung fruchtbar machen wollte.

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
