Letzler posits that this *cruff* requires readers to develop a sophisticated method of attentional modulation, allowing one to subtly distinguish between text requiring focused attention and text that must be skimmed or even skipped to avoid processing failures. *The Cruft of Fiction* shows how the attentional maturation prompted by reading mega novels can help manage the information overload that increasingly characterizes contemporary life.
