

# Response Paper Format

As with most types of written assignments, it's best to start your work with creating an outline. The outline for a response paper is simple. Here is a standard outline of a typical response paper:

- *Introduction*

The length of an introduction depends on the length of the paper: for a short paper it's better to keep the introduction up to 1 paragraph long. Introduce the work you're responding to along with a personal touch: for example, explain how the topics touched in the work correspond with your own beliefs or how much you know about the topic prior to reading the work of the author.

- *Summary*

A brief summary of the work is very important for those readers who are not familiar with the piece you're reacting to, but it's far from being the most vital and longest part of your work. The summary should not be a simple retelling of the story - it should have an analytical nature. For example, here you can discuss whether the author was successful in getting their points across.

- *Organizing argument*

If you're dealing with a piece that focuses on one major point, the format of an organizing argument works best. In order to follow this format, you can write as many paragraphs as you need while focusing on whether you agree or disagree with the author. Provide textual evidence for your points, so that the readers know where you're coming from. Ideally, the evidence should be gathered before you even begin writing the outline.

- *Conclusion*

The conclusion of a short response paper should only be a couple of sentences long. Instead of retelling your arguments or the content of the work, consider analyzing the effect the author's piece has on the society and you personally.
