Arts was closed the Grand Prix de Rome symbol of the old order abolished for a while the establishment might continue as before but progressive architecture was set on a new course Beautifully illustrated and written to be accessible to all the book sets the discussion of architecture and urbanism in its social political and economic contexts As such it will appeal both to students and scholars of the history of architecture and urbanism and to those with a wider interest in France's post war history
