

## ARTICLE/JOURNAL REVIEW FORMAT

### Overview:

A critical article/journal review is not one that is inherently negative, but is rather an evaluation of the effectiveness of the argument the author of the article journal is trying to make. The key word here is evaluation—the review is much like an essay in which the writer supports his evaluation of the article journal. It is intended to give the reader an idea of how the article journal could contribute to their knowledge of the subject. It is not simply a summary, and indeed, very little summary will be involved. The review should be written in a concise manner and take up less than **two pages** (about 600 words).

### Heading:

At the top of the page, put your name, matrix number, date, and group. The title of the article journal review will be the citation in APA format of the article journal.

### The Body of the Review:

Cover the following areas in your review. The descriptions below gives you many options in the form of questions—you will not have the space to answer each question, so choose the ones that are important for the particular article journal you are reviewing. You do need to address all of the areas and you must find space for specific examples to support your evaluation. Divide the review into logical paragraphs with effective transitions as you would with an essay. The paragraphs do not have to mirror the numbered sections below; choose the most effective organizational scheme for what you have to say.

1. **Introduction:** Provide background information which is pertinent to the study.
2. **Problem Statement:** It must present something critical that requires the researcher(s) to conduct the research in order to remedy the problem and ensure the long-term survival.  
Examples:  
In your sentence, you should take an opportunity to:
  - Highlight an existing problem affecting the future survival of an organization...
  - Highlight the present policy or method that is no longer seems to be working...
  - Highlight something that need close attention such the increase in customer complaints, declining in sales volume...
  - Highlight current trend, current need, current technology that your organization needs to adapt and change accordingly...
  - Highlight the changes in socio-economic variables such as life-style, consumer income, taste that might affect the long-term survival of your organization ...
3. **Objectives:** What is the author's purpose—what is the researcher(s) trying to accomplish in writing the article journal?
