Called *My Back* Moraga Anzald a 1983 and more recently *Telling to Live* Latina Feminist Testimonios Latina Feminist Group 2001 have demonstrated the power of testimonio as a genre that exposes brutality disrupts silencing and builds solidarity among women of colour Within the field of education scholars are increasingly taking up testimonio as a pedagogical methodological and activist approach to social justice which transgresses traditional paradigms in academia Unlike the more usual approach of researchers producing unbiased knowledge the testimonio challenges objectivity by situating the individual in communion with a collective experience marked by marginalization oppression or resistance This approach has resulted in new understandings about how marginalized communities build solidarity and respond to and resist dominant culture laws and policies that perpetuate inequity This book contributes to our understanding of testimonio as it relates to methodology pedagogy research and reflection in pursuit of social justice A common thread among the chapters is a sense of political urgency to address inequities within Chicana o and Latina o communities This book was originally published as a special issue of *Equity Excellence in Education*
