

# ESSAY TYPES

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## ARGUMENTATIVE

The aim here is to convince. Present an argument with a supporting body of evidence (can include statistic, theories, articles etc), which demonstrates thorough comprehension of the topic. Also includes an understanding of alternative arguments and an acknowledgment of any objects, with counter arguments as to why the presented point is correct.

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## COMPARATIVE

Sometimes can be described as compare and/or contrast essays. Identify the similarities and differences in two or more ideas, notions, books, poems, theories etc. demonstrate the strength and weaknesses of the options. May be asked to determine which is better in which case do so and justify choice.

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## DESCRIPTIVE

This style aims to paint a picture. Description and explanation of the main points and facts of a topic, with a critical examination of the strengths and limitations.

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## SUMMARIES

This essay type is condensed and concise composition of an original longer text, outlining the main facts but leaving out details or drawn out elaborations.

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## CRITICAL ANALYSIS

The intention of this essay style is to come to a reasoned judgment on a topic. Present supporting information around the topic, determining strength and weaknesses, possible issues or advantages. State final conclusion and what the implications might be.

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## REVIEWS

Description of a topic, idea, or text including contextual information, summaries of the main points and relevant thoughts and theories about the subject. Present an assessment of the information, its strengths and weakness and its contribution to the field.

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## PROCESS

Most commonly found in the sciences, this essay style details and explains the proceedings of something in chronological order such as an experiment. Usually followed by the results and a short discussion of the process and the implications.
