

History Essay Black Power Movement.

The black power movement was a philosophy that advocated for black people to seek freedom from white authority, uphold racial pride and seek self-determination.

The Black Power Movement (BPM) emerged out of black discontent with the achievements of the CRM. CRM focused on ending systematic racial laws in Southern American states through passive resistance and civil disobedience. The achievements of the CRM were not welcomed as the lives of black people living in the Northern States of America did not change, instead racism was summit, living conditions were severe – 30% of black people living below the poverty line in places called ghettos where police brutality was prominent. African Americans were disillusioned with the slow pass of change and felt that the use of violence was justified in order to achieve equality, whilst growing nationalist feelings being the right to govern themselves.

The philosophy of black power materialized as an attempt to encourage black people to have pride, dignity, self-respect and self-reliance amongst other black people. Due to this, the black power gained massive uphold from many black people and soon became a movement, black power movement. This movement was an ideological philosophy that advocated for economic and political power of black people, self-defense against racial oppression and the promotion of black interests. Though the main idea of bpm was for black people to seek freedom from white authority.

Malcom X, intellectual father of BP was an Islamic human rights activist who preached black sufficiency and armed self-defense against racial oppression and racism. Malcom X believed in the self-help concept, wanting black people to stand up for freedom, equality and justice. Though his main conviction was black separatism and self-determination without being integrated with white people. This was known as black nationalism.
