One reason was because she was never able to find books to read about neighborhoods like hers and children like those she knew. In later interviews, Beverly always said that she got her ideas from her "own experience and the world around her." Today, kids can read about beloved characters like Ramona and Beezus Quimby, Henry Hugains, and Ellen Tebbits. Beverly Cleary is one of the most successful American children's authors, with 91 million (and counting!) books sold all around the world, and she was named a Living Legend by the Library of Congress, Beverly Cleary died on March 25th, 1991.
