Review Questions

1. Answer: 2
Rationale: Growth during adolescence does not proceed at the same rate in all systems (2). Therefore, teens often have "gangly" appearances and movements. This has nothing to do with maturation points between generations (1) or with sleeping (4). The final 20% of mature height that is achieved during adolescence is called the growth spurt, as opposed to slower growth (3) and usually occurs by 18 years of age. The major cause of weight gain is the increase in skeletal mass or a slowing of growth during adolescence.
2. Answer: 2
Rationale: Young people who are unable to master confusion and establish an identity may cling to the conformity of peer groups long after the need should have passed (2). They may become rigid in their actions, as opposed to becoming too flexible in choosing rules or boundaries (1). Some show an inordinate need for something "new and exciting," as opposed
