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The Nasty Woman and The Neo Femme Fatale in Contemporary Cinema Agnieszka Piotrowska, 2018-12-07 The Nasty Woman and the Neo Femme Fatale in Contemporary Cinema puts forward the theoretical notion of the nasty woman as a means of examining female protagonists in contemporary culture and cinema particularly films directed by women The phrase is taken from an insult thrown at Hillary Clinton during the 2016 Presidential election debates and reclaimed by the feminists worldwide The volume also draws from the figure of the femme fatale in film noir Piotrowska presents the nasty woman across cultural and mythical landscape as a figure fighting against the entitlement of the patriarchy The writer argues that in films such as Zero Dark Thirty Red Road Stories We Tell and even Gone Girl the nastiness of female characters creates a new space for reflection on contemporary society and its struggles against patriarchal systems The nasty woman or neo femme fatale is a

figure who disrupts stable situations and norms she is pro active and self determining and at times unafraid to use dubious means to achieve her goals She is often single but when married she subverts and undermines the fundamental principles of this patriarchal institution For students and researchers in Cultural Studies Women s Gender and Sexuality Studies Film Studies and Psychoanalysis in Film Studies *The Nasty Woman and the Neo Femme Fatale in Contemporary Cinema* offers an original way of thinking about female creativity and subjectivity It is also a proud celebration of feminist and female authorship in contemporary Hollywood

Dancing an Embodied Sinthome Megan Sherritt, 2024-01-04 This book provides the first in depth analysis of Lacanian psychoanalytic theory and the art of dance and explores what each practice can offer the other It takes as its starting point Jacques Lacan s assertion that James Joyce s literary works helped him create what Lacan terms a sinthome thereby preventing psychosis That is Joyce s use of written language helped him maintain a normal existence despite showing tendencies towards psychosis Here it is proposed that writing was only the method through which Joyce worked but that the key element in his sinthome was play specifically the play of the Lacanian real The book moves on to consider how dance operates similarly to Joyce s writing and details the components of Joyce s sinthome not as a product that keeps him sane but as an interminable process for coping with the Lacanian real The author contends that Joyce goes beyond words and meaning using language s metre tone rhythm and cadence to play with the real mirroring his experience

of it and confining it to his works creating order in the chaos of his mind The art of dance is shown to be a process that likewise allows one to play with the real However it is emphasized that dance goes further it also teaches someone how to play if one doesn't already know how This book offers a compelling analysis that sheds new light on the fields of psychoanalysis and dance and looks to what this can tell us about and the possibilities for both practices concluding that psychoanalysis and dance both offer processes that open possibilities that might otherwise seem impossible This original analysis will be of particular interest to those working in the fields of psychoanalysis aesthetics psychoanalytic theory critical theory art therapy and dance studies

Absence in Cinema Justin Remes, 2020-07-14 Absence has played a crucial role in the history of avant garde aesthetics from the blank canvases of Robert Rauschenberg to Yves Klein s invisible paintings from the silent music of John Cage to Samuel Beckett s minimalist theater Yet little attention has been given to the important role of absence in cinema In the first book to focus on cinematic absence Justin Remes demonstrates how omissions of expected elements can spur viewers to interpret and understand the nature of film in new ways While most film criticism focuses on what is present such as images on the screen and music and dialogue on the soundtrack Remes contends that what is missing is an essential part of the cinematic experience He examines films without images such as Walter Ruttmann s Weekend 1930 a montage of sounds recorded in Berlin and films without sound such as Stan Brakhage s Window Water Baby Moving 1959 which documents the birth of the filmmaker s first child He also examines found footage films that erase elements from preexisting films such as Naomi Uman s removed 1999 which uses nail polish and bleach to blot out all the women from a pornographic film and Martin Arnold s Deanimated 2002 which digitally eliminates images and sounds from a Bela Lugosi B movie Remes maps out the effects and significations of filmic voids while grappling with their implications for film theory Through a careful analysis of a broad array of avant garde works Absence in Cinema reveals that films must be understood not only in terms of what they show but also what they withhold

Out of the Past Ben Tyrer, 2016-08-17 This book presents a new reading of film noir through psychoanalytic theory In a field now dominated by Deleuzian and
