Garritzmman,2016-08-17 This book analyzes the political economy of higher education finance across a range of OECD countries exploring why some students pay extortionate tuition fees whilst for others their education is free What are the redistributational consequences of these different tuition subsidy systems Analysing the variety of existing systems Garritzmman shows that across the advanced democracies Four Worlds of Student Finance exist Historically however all countries higher education systems looked very much alike in the 1940s The book develops a theoretical model the Time Sensitive Partisan Theory to explain why countries have evolved from a similar historical starting point to today s very distinct Four Worlds The empirical analyses combine a wide variety of qualitative and quantitative evidence studying higher education policies in all advanced democracies from 1945 2015 Lobbying for Higher Education Constance Ewing Cook,1998 Historically many faculty and administrators in higher education have regarded themselves as above the fray part of the national interest not a special interest and considered lobbying a dirty business unworthy of their lofty enterprise Now that academia no longer enjoys all the respect and good will that federal policy makers once afforded it that attitude has changed The Republican sweep of the 1994 Congressional elections served as a wake up call for the higher education community In response it made a spirited effort to gain attention for its own policy preferences Lobbying for Higher Education is about how the major higher education associations and the constituent American colleges and universities try to influence federal policy especially congressional policy In clear prose Cook explains how the higher education community organizes itself in Washington how it lobbies and how its major interest groups are perceived both by their own members and by public officials The book focuses on the crucial development in 1995 1996 of a new lobbying paradigm which included the greater use of campus based resources and ad hoc coalitions The most engrossing part of its story is higher education s creative response to the policy turmoil and disruption of the status quo that resulted from the shift in congressional party control The author Constance Cook uses sources unique to this project over 1 500 survey responses from college and university presidents a 62% return rate and nearly 150 interviews with institutional and association leaders Fortuitously the 1994 electoral upheaval provided her with an opportunity to capture analyze and interpret the responses of her subjects in a

period of unusually sweeping change Lobbying for Higher Education is a timely book with an interesting and important story at its core

Native American Higher Education in the United States Cary Carney, 2017-09-08 Many aspects of Native American education have been given extensive attention There are plentiful works on the boarding school program the mission school efforts and other aspects of Indian education Higher education however has received little examination Select articles passages and occasional chapters touch on it but usually only in respect to specific subjects as an adjunct to education in general There is no thorough and comprehensive history of Native American higher education in the United States Native American Higher Education in the United States fills this need and is now available in paperback Carney reviews the historical development of higher education for the Native American community from the age of discovery to the present The author has constructed his book chronologically in three eras the colonial period featuring several efforts at Indian missions in the colonial colleges the federal period when Native American higher education was largely ignored except for sporadic tribal and private efforts and the self determination period highlighted by the recent founding of the tribally controlled colleges Carney also includes a chapter comparing Native American higher education with African American higher education The concluding chapter discusses the current status of Native American higher education Carney's book fills an informational gap while at the same time opening the field of Native American higher education to continuing exploration It will be valuable reading for educators and historians and general readers interested in Native American culture

Women in Higher Education Ana M. Martínez Alemán, Kristen A. Renn, 2002-12-13 The only comprehensive encyclopedia on the subject of women in higher education America's first wave of feminists Susan B Anthony Elizabeth Cady Stanton and others included expanded opportunities for higher education in their Declaration of Sentiments at the first Women's Rights Convention in Seneca Falls New York in 1848 By then the first American institutions to educate women had been founded among them Mt Holyoke Seminary in 1837 However not until after the Civil War did most universities admit women and not for egalitarian purposes War casualties had caused a drop in enrollment and the states needed teachers Women students paid tuition but as teachers were paid salaries half that of men By the late 20th century there were more female than male students of higher education but women remained
