

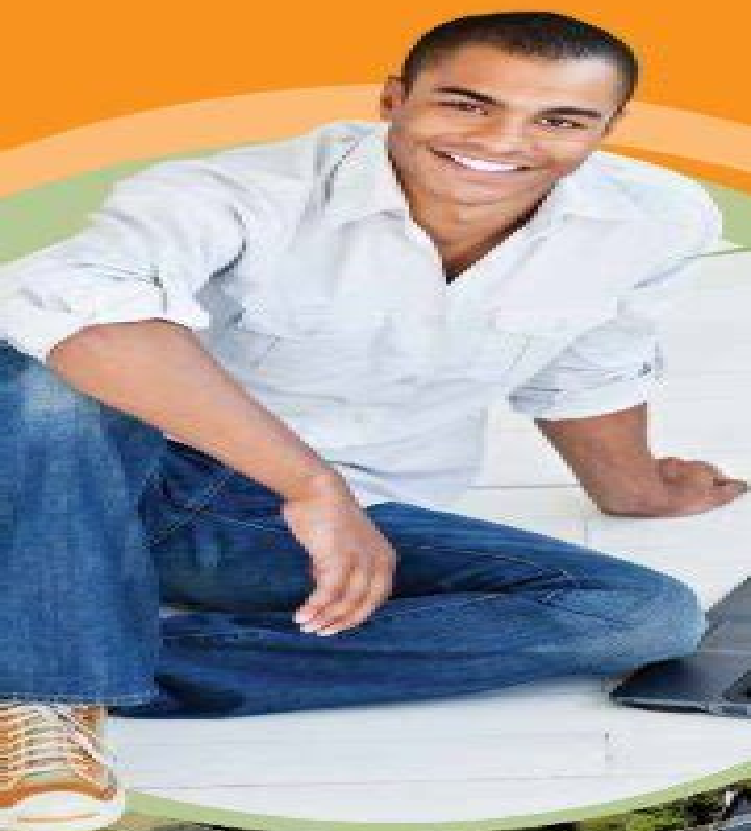

In *Learning Zulu* Sanders places his own endeavors within a wider context to uncover how in the past 150 years of South African history Zulu became a battleground for issues of property possession and deprivation. Sanders combines elements of analysis and memoir to explore a complex cultural history. Perceiving that colonial learners of Zulu saw themselves as repairing harm done to Africans by Europeans Sanders reveals deeper motives at work in the development of Zulu language learning from the emergence of the pidgin Fanagalo among missionaries and traders in the nineteenth century to widespread efforts in the twentieth and twenty first centuries to teach a correct form of Zulu. Sanders looks at the white appropriation of Zulu language music and dance in South African culture and at the association of Zulu with a martial masculinity. In exploring how Zulu has come to represent what is most properly and powerfully African Sanders examines differences in English and Zulu language press coverage of an important trial as well as the role of linguistic purism in xenophobic violence in South Africa. Through one person's efforts to learn the Zulu language *Learning Zulu* explores how a language's history and politics influence all individuals in a multilingual society A Life for Freedom Denis Goldberg, 2016-03-18 From June 1963 to October 1964 ten anti-apartheid activists were tried at South Africa's Pretoria Supreme Court. Standing among the accused with Nelson Mandela Ahmed

Kathrada and Walter Sisulu was Denis Goldberg Charged under the Sabotage and Suppression of Communism Acts for campaigning to overthrow the government by violent revolution Goldberg was found guilty and sentenced to life imprisonment The only white man convicted during the infamous Rivonia trial he played a historic role in the struggle for justice in South Africa In this remarkable autobiography Goldberg discusses growing up acutely aware of the injustice permeating his homeland He joined the South African Communist Party and helped found the Congress of Democrats It was his role as an officer in the armed underground wing of the African National Congress ANC however that led to his life sentence the outcome of which was a staggering twenty two years behind bars While he was incarcerated the racist dogma of apartheid imposed complete separation from his black comrades and colleagues a segregation that denied him both the companionship and the counsel of his fellow accused Recounted with humor and humility Goldberg s story not only provides a sweeping overview of life in South Africa both during and after apartheid but also illuminates the experiences of the activists and oppressors whose fates were bound together

**The Prison Letters of Nelson Mandela** Nelson Mandela,2018-07-10 One of NPR s Great Reads of 2018 An unforgettable portrait of one of the most inspiring historical figures of the twentieth century published on the centenary of his birth Arrested in 1962 as South Africa s apartheid regime intensified its brutal campaign against political opponents forty four year old lawyer and African National Congress activist Nelson Mandela had no idea that he would spend the next twenty seven years in jail During his 10 052 days of incarceration the future leader of South Africa wrote a multitude of letters to unyielding prison authorities fellow activists government officials and most memorably to his courageous wife Winnie and his five children Now 255 of these letters many of which have never been published provide exceptional insight into how Mandela maintained his inner spirits while living in almost complete isolation and how he engaged with an outside world that became increasingly outraged by his plight Organized chronologically and divided by the four venues in which he was held as a sentenced prisoner The Prison Letters of Nelson Mandela begins in Pretoria Local Prison where Mandela was held following his 1962 trial In 1964 Mandela was taken to Robben Island Prison where a stark existence was lightened only by visits and letters from family After eighteen years Mandela was transferred to Pollsmoor Prison a large complex outside of Cape Town with beds and better food but where he and four of his comrades were confined to a rooftop cell apart from the

rest of the prison population Finally Mandela was taken to Victor Verster Prison in 1988 where he was held until his release on February 11 1990 With accompanying facsimiles of some of his actual letters this landmark volume reveals how Mandela a lawyer by training advocated for prisoners human rights It reveals him to be a loving father who wrote to his daughter I sometimes wish science could invent miracles and make my daughter get her missing birthday cards and have the pleasure of knowing that her Pa loves her aware that photos and letters he sent had simply disappeared More painful still are the letters written in 1969 when Mandela forbidden from attending the funerals of his mother and his son Thembi was reduced to consoling family members through correspondence Yet what emerges most powerfully is Mandela s unfaltering optimism Honour belongs to those who never forsake the truth even when things seem dark grim who try over and over again who are never discouraged by insults humiliation even defeat Whether providing unwavering support to his also imprisoned wife or outlining a human rights philosophy that resonates today The Prison Letters of Nelson Mandela reveals the heroism of a man who refused to compromise his moral values in the face of extraordinary punishment Ultimately these letters position Mandela as one of the most inspiring figures of the twentieth century From The Prison Letters of Nelson Mandela A new world will be won not by those who stand at a distance with their arms folded but by those who are in the arena whose garments are torn by storms whose bodies are maimed in the course of contest I am convinced that floods of personal disaster can never drown a determined revolutionary nor can the cumulus of misery that accompanies tragedy suffocate him My respect for human beings is based not on the colour of a man s skin nor authority he may wield but purely on merit A good pen can also remind us of the happiest moments in our lives bring noble ideas into our dens our blood our souls It can turn tragedy into hope victory

**Profiles in Diversity** Patricia Romero, 1998-08-31 A revealing oral history collection Profiles in Diversity contains in depth interviews of twenty six women in South Africa from different racial class and age backgrounds Conducted in Johannesburg Pretoria Bloemfontein Vryburg Cape Town Port Elizabeth Grahamstown Durban and a rural section of Kwa Zulu Natal these life histories encompass diverse experiences ranging from a squatter in a township outside Cape Town to an ANC activist in Port Elizabeth who lost three sons to the struggle for democracy and who herself was imprisoned several times during what many in South Africa now refer to as the civil war Nearly all of these women describe their formative years spent growing up in South Africa s segregated society Three young black students discuss the hardships they experienced in an unequal educational system as well as aspects of segregation in their childhood They are joined in their memories and hopes for the future by two mature women one now a high court judge in Durban and the other a linguist at the University of South Africa in Pretoria both of whom studied at Harvard in the United States Nancy Charton the first woman ordained as an Anglican

priest in South Africa speaks about her past and what led her in her early seventies to a vocation in the church Three Afrikaner women including one in her late twenties speak about growing up in South Africa and articulate their concerns for a future that in some respects differs from the predictions of their English speaking or black sisters Two now deceased members of the South African Communist Party provide disparate accounts of what led them to lives of active opposition to the discrimination that marked the lives of people of color long before apartheid became embedded in South Africa's legal system Also included is an account by Dr Goonam an Indian woman who grew up in relative comfort in the then province of Natal while Ray Alexander discusses how she witnessed the tyranny visited on the Jews of her native Latvia before immigrating to the Cape
