South African universities face major challenges in meeting the needs of their students in the area of academic language and literacy. The dominant medium of instruction in the universities is English and to a much lesser extent Afrikaans but only a minority of the national population are native speakers of these languages. Nine other languages can be media of instruction in schools which makes the transition to tertiary education difficult enough in itself for students from these schools. The focus of this book is on procedures for assessing the academic language and literacy levels and needs of students not in order to exclude students from higher education but rather to identify those who would benefit from further development of their ability in order to undertake their degree studies successfully. The volume also aims to bring the innovative solutions designed by South African educators to a wider international audience.

Most Americans had no idea what Common Core was in 2013 according to polls. But it had been creeping into schools nationwide over the previous three years and children were feeling its effects. They cried over math homework so mystifying their parents could not help them even in elementary school. They read motley assortments of informational text instead of classic literature. They dreaded the high stakes tests in unfamiliar formats that were increasingly controlling their classrooms. How did this latest and most sweeping reform of American education come in mostly under the radar? Common Core and its testing regime were touted as an absolute game changer in public education yet the evidence so far suggests that kids are actually learning less under it. Why then was such a costly and disruptive agenda imposed on the nation's schools? Who benefits? And how can citizens regain local self governance in education so their children's minds will be fed a more nourishing intellectual diet and be protected from the experiments of emboldened bureaucrats? *The Education Invasion* offers answers and remedies.

Writing, Redefined Shawna Coppola, 2023-10-10
What does it mean to write or to be a writer? Effectiveness of teachers' guides in the Global South Benjamin Piper, Yasmin Sitabkhan, Jessica Mejia, Kellie Betts, 2018-05-10 This report presents the results of RTI International Education's study on teachers guides across 13 countries and 19 projects Using quantitative and qualitative methods we examine how teachers guides across the projects differ and find substantial variation in the design and structure of the documents We develop a scripting index so that the scripting levels of the guides can be compared across projects The impact results of the programs that use teachers guides show significant impacts on learning outcomes associated with approximately an additional half year of learning showing that structured teachers guides contribute to improved learning outcomes During observations we find that teachers make a variety of changes in their classroom instruction from how the guides are written showing that the utilization of structured teachers guides do not create robotic teachers unable to use their own professional skills to teach children Unfortunately many changes that teachers make reduce the amount of group work and interactivity that was described in the guides suggesting that programs should encourage teachers to more heavily utilize the instructional routines designed in the guide The report includes a set of research based guidelines that material developers can use to develop teachers guides that will support effective instructional practices and help improve learning outcomes The key takeaway from the report is that structured teachers guides improve learning outcomes but that overly scripted teachers guides are somewhat less effective than simplified teachers guides that give specific guidance to the teacher but are not written word for word for each lesson in the guide
