Wallace, 2001 Ecocriticism a field of study that has expanded dramatically over the past decade has nevertheless remained until recently closely focused on critical analyses of nature writing and literature of wilderness The authors push well beyond that established framework with this collection of essays by respected ecocritics and scholars from the literary and environmental arenas *Kafka and the Universal* Arthur Cools, Vivian Liska, 2016-07-25 Kafka's work has been attributed a universal significance and is often regarded as the ultimate witness of the human condition in the twentieth century Yet his work is also considered paradigmatic for the expression of the singular that cannot be subsumed under any generalization This paradox engenders questions not only concerning the meaning of the universal as it manifests itself in and is transformed by Kafka's writings but also about the expression of the singular in literary fiction as it challenges the opposition between the universal and the singular The contributions in this volume approach these questions from a variety of perspectives They are structured according to the following issues ambiguity as a tool of deconstructing the pre established philosophical meanings of the universal the concept of the law as a major symbol for the universal meaning of Kafka's writings the presence of animals in Kafka's texts the modernist mode of writing as challenge of philosophical concepts of the universal and the meaning and relevance of the universal in contemporary Kafka reception This volume examines central aspects of the interplay between philosophy and literature *Franz Kafka and his Prague Contexts* Marek Nekula, 2016-03-01 Franz Kafka is by far the Prague author most widely read and admired internationally However his reception in Czechoslovakia launched by the Liblice conference in 1963 has been conflicted While rescuing Kafka from years of censorship and neglect Czech critics of the 1960s overwrote his German and Jewish literary and cultural contexts in order to focus on his Czech cultural connections Seeking to rediscover Kafka's multiple backgrounds in Franz Kafka and His Prague Contexts Marek Nekula focuses on Kafka's Jewish social and literary networks in Prague his German and Czech bilingualism and his knowledge of Yiddish and Hebrew Kafka's bilingualism is discussed in the context of contemporary essentialist views of a writer's organic language and identity Nekula also pays particular attention to Kafka's education examining his studies of Czech language and literature as well as its role in his intellectual life The book concludes by asking how Kafka read his urban environment looking at the readings of Prague encoded in his fictional and nonfictional texts

Nekula's work has had a major impact on our understanding of Kafka's relation to the complex social cultural and linguistic environment of early twentieth century Prague. While little of this work has been available in English until now, the present volume translates many of his most important studies and includes revisions and expansions appearing now for the first time. Nekula challenges stubborn clichés and opens important new perspectives. Readers interested in questions relating to Kafka and Prague will find this an essential and richly rewarding book.

Kafka's Zoopoetics Naama Harel, 2020-05-04

Nonhuman figures are ubiquitous in the work of Franz Kafka, from his early stories down to his very last one. Despite their prominence throughout his oeuvre, Kafka's animal representations have been considered first and foremost as mere allegories of intrahuman matters. In recent years, the allegorization of Kafka's animals has been poetically dismissed by Kafka's commentators and politically rejected by posthumanist scholars. Such critique, however, has yet to inspire either an overarching or an interdiscursive account. This book aims to fill this lacuna, positing animal stories as a distinct and significant corpus within Kafka's entire poetics and closely examining them in dialogue with both literary and posthumanist analysis. *Kafka's Zoopoetics* critically revisits animality, interspecies relations, and the very human-animal contradistinction in the writings of Franz Kafka. Kafka's animals typically stand at the threshold between humanity and animality, fusing together human and nonhuman features. Among his liminal creatures, we find a human transformed into vermin in *The Metamorphosis*, an ape turned into a human being in *A Report to an Academy*, talking jackals in *Jackals and Arabs*, a philosophical dog in *Researches of a Dog*, a contemplative mole-like creature in *The Burrow*, and indiscernible beings in *Josefine the Singer* or *the Mouse People*. Depicting species boundaries as mutable and obscure, Kafka creates a fluid human-animal space which can be described as humanimal. The constitution of a humanimal space radically undermines the stark barrier between human and

On Flinching Tiffany Watt Smith, 2014-05-22 While the end of the nineteenth century is often associated with the rise of objectivity and its ideal of a restrained observer scientific experiments continued to create emotional even theatrical relationships between scientist and his subject *On Flinching* focuses on moments in which scientific observers flinched from sudden noises winced at the sight of an animal's pain or cringed when he was caught looking as ways to consider a distinctive motif of passionate and gestured looking in the laboratory and beyond It was not their laboratory machines who these scientific observers most closely resembled but the self consciously emotional theatrical audiences of the period Tiffany Watt Smith offers close readings of four experiments performed by the naturalist Charles Darwin the physiologist David Ferrier the neurologist Henry Head and the psychologist Arthur Hurst Bringing together flinching scientific observers with actors and spectators in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century theatre it places the history of scientific looking in its wider cultural context arguing that even at the dawn of objectivity the techniques and problems of the stage continued to haunt scientific life In turn it suggests that by exploring the ways recoiling shrinking and wincing becoming paradigmatic spectatorial gestures in this period we can understand the ways Victorians thought about looking as itself an emotional and gestured performance
