*Freud and the Question of Pseudoscience* Frank Cioffi, 1998 In the early 1970s Cioffi demonstrated that Freud falsified the account of his discovery of the Oedipus complex an account that had gone unquestioned until that time Moreover Cioffi showed that this misrepresentation was necessary to the propagation of the Oedipus theory The author subsequently revealed Freud's falsifications in retracting his theory of infantile seduction a revelation that has been often cited in recent books and scholarly journals
