Shadow Libraries Joe Karaganis,2018-05-04 How students get the materials they need as opportunities for higher education expand but funding shrinks From the top down Shadow Libraries explores the institutions that shape the provision of educational materials from the formal sector of universities and publishers to the broadly informal ones organized by faculty copy shops student unions and students themselves It looks at the history of policy battles over access to education in the post World War II era and at the narrower versions that have played out in relation to research and textbooks from library policies to book subsidies to more recently the several open publication models that have emerged in the higher education sector From the bottom up Shadow Libraries explores how simply students get the materials they need It maps the ubiquitous practice of photocopying and what are in many cases the more marginal ones of buying books visiting libraries and downloading from unauthorized sources It looks at the informal networks that emerge in many contexts to share materials from face to face student networks to Facebook groups and at the processes that lead to the consolidation of some of those efforts into more organized archives that circulate offline and sometimes online the shadow libraries of the title If Alexandra Elbakyan s Sci Hub is the largest of these efforts to date the more characteristic part of her story is the prologue the personal struggle to participate in global scientific and educational communities and the recourse to a wide array of ad hoc strategies and networks when formal authorized means are lacking If Elbakyan s story has struck a chord it is in part because it brings this contradiction in the academic project into sharp relief universalist in principle and unequal in practice Shadow Libraries is a study of that tension in the digital era Contributors Bal zs Bod Laura Czerniewicz Mirosław Filiciak Mariana Fossatti Jorge Gernetto Eve Gray Evelin Heidel Joe

generation When assessed against this goal their record is discouraging Since the 1970s income per capita in the median middle income country has stagnated at less than a tenth of the US level With aging populations growing protectionism and escalating pressures to speed up the energy transition today s middle income economies face ever more daunting odds To become advanced economies despite the growing headwinds they will have to make miracles Drawing on the development experience and advances in economic analysis since the 1950s World Development Report 2024 identifies pathways for developing economies to avoid the middle income trap It points to the need for not one but two transitions for those at the middle income level the first from investment to infusion and the second from infusion to innovation Governments in lower middle income countries must drop the habit of repeating the same investment driven strategies and work instead to infuse modern technologies and successful business processes from around the world into their economies This requires reshaping large swaths of those economies into globally competitive suppliers of goods and services Upper middle income countries that have mastered infusion can accelerate the shift to innovation not just borrowing ideas from the global frontiers of technology but also beginning to push the frontiers outward This requires restructuring enterprise work and energy use once again with an even greater emphasis on economic freedom social mobility and political contestability Neither transition is automatic The handful of economies that made speedy transitions from middle to high income status have encouraged enterprise by disciplining powerful incumbents developed talent by rewarding merit and capitalized on crises to alter policies and institutions that no longer suit the purposes they were once designed to serve Today s middle income countries will have to do the same

Going to University. The Influence of Higher Education on the Lives of Young South Africans Jennifer Case,Delia Marshall,2018-02-09 Around the world more young people than ever before are attending university

Student numbers in South Africa have doubled since democracy and for many families higher education is a route to a better future for their children. But alongside the overwhelming demand for higher education, questions about its purposes have intensified. Deliberations about the curriculum, culture, and costing of public higher education abound from student activists, academics, parents, civil society, and policy makers. We know from macro research that South African graduates generally have good employment prospects. But little is known at a detailed level about how young people actually make use of their university experiences to craft their life courses. And even less is known about what happens to those who drop out. This accessible book brings together the rich life stories of 73 young people six years after they began their university studies. It traces how going to university influences not only their employment options but also nurtures the agency needed to chart their own way and to engage critically with the world around them. The book offers deep insights into the ways in which public higher education is both a private and public good and it provides significant conclusions pertinent to anyone who works in and cares about universities.

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
