

Kaufman Brief Intelligence Test, Second Edition (KBIT-2)

The Kaufman/Kaufman Brief Intelligence Test, Second Edition (KBIT-2) is a brief measure of the verbal and nonverbal intelligence of a wide range of children, adolescents, and adults, ages 4 through 90. The KBIT-2 is a screening measure of intelligence composed of two subtests: Matrices and Vocabulary. Scores from these two subtests are combined to form the IQ Composite, which serves as the measure of intelligence on the KBIT-2.

For two subtests (Verbal Knowledge and Matrices) of the instrument, the student is shown pictures on a tablet-on-card and asked questions about them. The student points to the correct answer on the card. For the third subtest (Picture) the student is asked questions and provides spontaneous verbal responses.

Verbal Subtest

Verbal Knowledge

The Verbal Knowledge subtest is the first subtest in the verbal intelligence portion of the instrument. This subtest contains two types of items. One type measures receptive vocabulary, in which the examinee sees a word and the student points to the picture that best illustrates the word. The other type measures general information about the world (history, geography, the arts, science, etc.). In these items, the examinee asks a general information question and the student points to the picture that best illustrates the answer.

Picture

The Picture subtest is the third subtest in the instrument, and the second verbal intelligence test. The Picture subtest measures verbal comprehension, reasoning, and vocabulary knowledge. No reading is involved. The examinee sees a picture and the student responds with the single word that answers the riddle. The examinee records the response.

Nonverbal Subtest

Matrices

The Matrices subtest is the second subtest and is the only test of non-verbal intelligence in the instrument. This subtest measures the participant's ability to solve non-pictorial, pairwise relationships, and complete verbal analogies. The examinee identifies the object in the bottom row that's related conceptually to the object shown above.
