PUTTING TOGETHER THE NARRATIVE

Allows the client to express their thoughts and explore events in their lives and the meanings they have placed on these experiences.

2

EXTERNALIZING THE PROBLEM

Leading clients towards viewing their problems or behaviors as external instead of an unchangeable part of themselves - they realize they themselves are not the problem.

3

DECONSTRUCTION

Working with the client to break down or deconstruct their stories into smaller, more manageable parts to clarify the problem.

4

UNIQUE OUTCOMES

This refers to the exceptions to the dominant story. Also known as 're-authoring' or 're-storying,' clients go through their experiences to find alterations to their story or make a whole new one.

current literature and research and offers suggestions for practice in psycho educational counseling and therapy groups The Handbook is divided into five main sections current and historical perspectives best practices multicultural and diverse groups groups in special settings and an introduction to special topics **"Circle": An Introduction and Examination of Its Appropriateness as a Narrative Group Therapy Technique with Adolescents** Joshua Relin,2007 Adolescence can be a difficult time especially for young men who are at risk due to communal and or familial stressors Group therapy has been demonstrated to be an effective form of treatment for at risk adolescents as it is geared towards the utilization of developmentally apposite factors such as the formation of an identity in relation to peers intensification of self awareness and empathy and interest in close relationships and friendships Shechtman 2004 Currently empirically supported treatments ESTs which tend towards cognitive behavioral and psycho educational modes of intervention dominate the adolescent group therapy field Guimon 2004 While these types of group treatment can be effective for some individuals they come up short in providing the kind of self expressiveness cathartic experiences social acceptance and support and guidance and training in areas of social deficit Shechtman 2004 p 436 that can be crucial to adolescents The current study examines one such group therapy technique that is geared towards providing treatment based on self expressiveness peer support and authentic interactions and self examination Called Circle it has been quietly developed in Arizona and California over the past 30 years in several different residential and day treatment settings In order to better understand Circle and its structure the current study was designed so as to construct a comprehensive history of Circle through several interviews of its creators The interviews were also analyzed using a grounded theory approach in order to ascertain the therapeutic intentions of Circle s creators and what emerged was a comprehensive philosophy and structure geared towards facilitating authentic expression The current study also integrated the information that was gathered about Circle with the current literature on narrative therapy a postmodern approach to treatment that has been shown to be effective with adolescent clients demonstrating that it could be effectively used as a means of conducting narrative group therapy Finally the author of the current study co facilitated a narrative Circle group at a public high school in the San Francisco Bay Area establishing that Circle can be a viable approach to treatment outside of the residential and day treatment settings where it is currently being utilized
