Is about *TIU*

The guided discovery model is an approach to instruction in which the teacher presents students with examples of a specific topic and guides students to an understanding of that topic.

Main idea

PLANNING

- Pick a topic
- Create clear learning objectives (what you want the students to know)
- Know the learning objectives
- create or find examples and/or non-examples about the topic
- You need to have high-quality examples (all examples that the students need to understand the learning objective), a variety of examples (multiple), and context for examples (shows students how to apply the topic to the real world)
- Types of examples-concrete materials "real thing", pictures, and models (visual representations)

Main idea

IMPLEMENTING

- Phase 1: Introduction
 - Grab the students' attention and provide a conceptual framework for the lesson
- Phase 2: Open-Ended Phase
 - You need to promote student involvement
 - You can give examples, ask students to identify patterns, and then allow time to go into groups and discuss or you can have a lesson in whole-group and follow up with questions
- Phase 3: Convergent Phase
 - Guide the students' responses so that they target a specific learning objective
- Phase 4: Closure and Application
 - Students are able to state characteristics about the concept

Main idea

ASSESSMENT

- Regular paper-and-pencil test
- Student portfolios/journals
- informal assessment during discussion
- Critical thinking/short answer questions

Main idea

MOTIVATION

- Students are motivated by their peers if working in groups
- Students are also self-motivated if they know that they will have a formal assessment after the lesson
- Students can also be motivated by the teacher

So what? What is important to understand about this?

The Guided Discovery Model is a great way for students to interact during the lesson whether it is whole-group or small-group discussion. This model is great because it can be use across different age groups with only slight modifications.
