Students are learning many strategies that help them generate ideas to write about. Below are a few strategies your child has learned. When they are a task, suggest some of the following to help them get over their writer's block.

- Make lists of interesting people or significant places, all special moments in your life, like the first time you did something exciting. When you have a few written down, choose one to write about.
- Start collecting family stories. If you've heard a particular family story again and again, write it down, record it, especially if you're told it by someone whose memory is fading. It's best to do this family research when told it and write the story about it.
- Look around! When you see a friend or from your life, like your favorite toy, a particular house, an old picture, what comes to your mind?
