The fact that the playwrights were aware of the features of this performance tradition makes their texts a potential mine of performance information and casts light back on the texts themselves if some of their meanings are spatial these will have been missed by purely literary tools of analysis English <u>Dramatick Opera</u>, 1661–1706 Andrew R. Walkling, 2019-03-19 English Dramatick Opera 1661 1706 is the first comprehensive
