

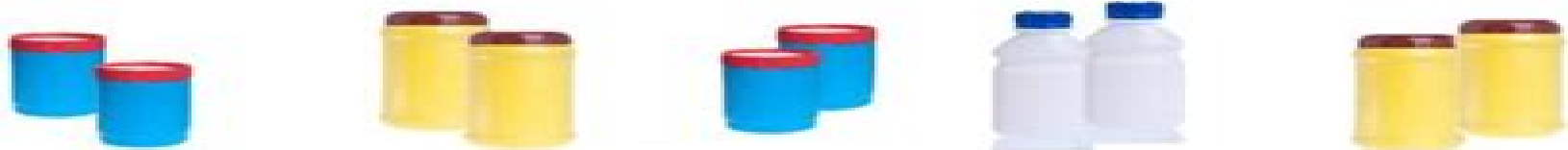
# Auditory Processing

## Fine-tune Auditory Discrimination Skills

## Match Sounds.

**Game: Identify two sounds that are the same.**

Use old film containers, or small plastic bottles, that have been washed out. Fill two of each container with the same level of rice, beans, stones, etc.. Hot-glue the lids to secure them. Ask the child to tell you why he thinks they match! Listen to the child's reasoning.



Notes: If you use a clear bottle cover it with paper. Big box stores still get film containers!

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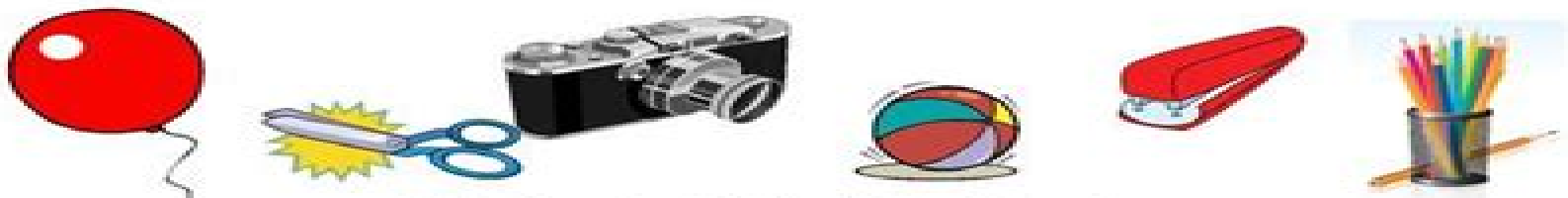

## Sound Identification

**Play a sound game!** Create a sound behind a board/divider. Ask the children to identify the sound. Suggestions: clap your hands, tear a piece of paper, cut paper with scissors, sharpen a pencil, snap your fingers, knock on wood, staple paper, click a camera, ring a bell, pop a balloon, bounce a ball.

Warning: I banged two blocks together one year, and much to my dismay, the children modelled creating that sound during activity time... for the next month!
