Types of Data

Quantitative - numerical data that can be measured

Qualitative - non-numerical data that describes qualities

Primary - data collected first-hand from the source

Secondary - data collected from existing sources

Discrete - data that can only take specific values

Continuous - data that can take any value within a range

Population - the entire group of individuals being studied

Sample - a subset of the population

Sampling - the process of selecting a sample from a population

Random Sampling - every member of the population has an equal chance of being selected

Systematic Sampling - selecting every kth member of the population

Stratified Sampling - dividing the population into strata and sampling from each

Cluster Sampling - dividing the population into clusters and sampling from one or more clusters

Measures of Central Tendency

Mean - the average of all values

Median - the middle value when data is ordered

Mode - the most frequent value

Range - the difference between the highest and lowest values

Interquartile Range (IQR) - the range between the first and third quartiles

Standard Deviation - a measure of the spread of the data

Variance - the square of the standard deviation

Coefficient of Variation - a measure of the relative variability

Probability

Sample Space - the set of all possible outcomes

Event - a subset of the sample space

Probability - the chance of an event occurring

Independent Events - events that do not affect each other

Dependent Events - events that do affect each other

Conditional Probability - the probability of an event occurring given that another event has occurred

Bayes' Theorem - a formula for calculating conditional probability

Statistics in Real Life

Quality Control - using statistics to ensure products meet standards

Market Research - using statistics to understand consumer behavior

Healthcare - using statistics to analyze medical data

Finance - using statistics to assess risk and return

Education - using statistics to evaluate teaching methods

Environment - using statistics to study climate change

Systematic Sampling

Definition - selecting every kth member of the population

Advantages - simple, easy to implement

Disadvantages - may introduce bias if there is a pattern in the data

Example - selecting every 10th person from a list

Stratified Sampling

Definition - dividing the population into strata and sampling from each

Advantages - ensures representation of all groups

Disadvantages - more complex than simple random sampling

Example - sampling by age group

Cluster Sampling

Definition - dividing the population into clusters and sampling from one or more clusters

Advantages - easy to implement, cost-effective

Disadvantages - may introduce bias if clusters are not representative

Example - sampling by school

Simple Random Sampling

Definition - every member of the population has an equal chance of being selected

Advantages - unbiased, simple

Disadvantages - may be time-consuming for large populations

Example - drawing names from a hat

Measures of Dispersion

Range - the difference between the highest and lowest values

IQR - the range between the first and third quartiles
