**Assessment for Learning without Limits** Alison Peacock, 2016-08-16. This book explores assessment practices that offer an enlightening and enabling view of all learners. Following the demise of national curriculum levels, the book embraces a unique opportunity to change how children are assessed. Rather than simply replacing the old structure with a new one, it focuses instead on enabling children to learn in meaningful ways so that assessment becomes a tool for improvement rather than judgment, by building on two influential research studies: *Learning without Limits* (Hart et al 2004) and *Creating Learning without Limits* (Swann et al 2012).
