rich in drama romance and heroics that culminate in a daring prison escape in the shadow of the guillotine *Novel* by Charles Dickens published both serially and in book form in 1859 The story is set in the late 18th century against the background of the French Revolution Although Dickens borrowed from Thomas Carlyle's history *The French Revolution* for his sprawling tale of London and revolutionary Paris the novel offers more drama than accuracy The scenes of large scale mob violence are especially vivid if superficial in historical understanding The complex plot involves Sydney Carton's sacrifice of his own life on behalf of his friends Charles Darnay and Lucie Manette
