1-1 Brief Description of Child and Family

Tiffany is a third-grade student at Warren Elementary School. Tiffany is an engaging child, who is personable and loves to talk. Nevertheless, her teachers and parents are concerned about her academic progress and wonder if she is ready for fourth grade. Tiffany has begun saying that she is "stupid," "can't learn anything," and that she hates school. Her parents, Michael and Patty, are worried. They have watched their once happy little girl who loved school change to a child who begs to stay home, has stomachaches during homework, and cries herself to sleep.

Tiffany is the youngest of three children. Her older sister is an honor roll student in high school. Her older brother, who has been diagnosed with learning disabilities that primarily impact language, is in middle school, where he is doing fairly well with some support for reading. Her father, Michael, is a manager for a large hardware and building supply store, and her mother, Patty, is a secretary at the county hospital. Both parents have some post-secondary education, but neither graduated from college. Tiffany was diagnosed with a learning disability in first grade and with attention deficit hyperactive disorder (combined type) in second grade, when her teachers noticed that she often seemed to disengage mentally during tasks she found challenging.
