This extract focuses on the reasons for Lenin's New Economic Policy.

In March 1921 Lenin announced the end of War Communism and the inauguration of a New Economic Policy. The NEP was based on the following:

Requisitions from peasants were ended and a fixed tax in kind (grain) was substituted – which by 1924 had become a money tax. Once this tax was paid, the peasant was free to do what he liked with what remained. He could use it himself, sell it to the state or sell it on the open market which was now made legal. Private enterprise was allowed in trade and small-scale industry. Compulsory labour ceased; labour armies were stopped; bonuses were introduced for extra work. The currency was back on a sound footing and a regular system of taxation was introduced. Large-scale industry (coal, iron, steel, oil, electricity, railways) remained state-owned.
