Put on a play at your school, a fair or festival about local environmental or human needs issues.



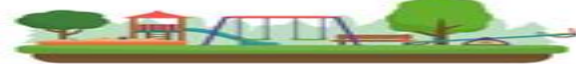
Collect items for a time capsule.
