IEP goals aimed at improving anxiety mandate that the school/staff provide tools support, and assessments with the intention of improving anxiety in the school setting. These goals should be in addition to academic goals when necessary.

- When facing a challenging situation, Student will define the problem and come up with at least two possible solutions to the problem % of the time.
- When needing assistance, Student will demonstrate appropriate skills in asking for help at appropriate times % of the time.
- When help is needed, Student will explain the kind of help needed for a situation % of the time.
- When negative feelings or behaviors arise, Student will attend a debriefing session held at an appropriate time and place where student will try to identify triggers and possible strategies for improvement % of the time.
- When given a task that Student correctly identifies as difficult, the student will create a plan for accomplishing the task % of the time.
- Student will increase independent work time by completing one task with one or less adult prompts 3 out of 5 opportunities to do so.

Suffering in Silence Donna Mac LCPC, 2015-09-29 Selective mutism is an anxiety disorder and its currently one of the most misunderstood under diagnosed and undertreated mental health conditions When children with selective mutism feel expected or pressured to speak in social situations they become terrified Therefore their level of anxiety significantly increases but by remaining silent their anxiety level slightly decreases obtaining some relief for themselves For these children remaining silent is actually an ineffective coping mechanism or a maladapted solution to create a sense of safety within themselves Hence their mouths freeze and they are silent This is temporary relief but longitudinally these children suffer in silence Due to the fact that many children will display normative shy behavior or even socially anxious behavior at times it can be challenging to discern if the child's behavior falls within normal limits or if the child actually demonstrates clinically significant behavior signifying a selective mutism diagnosis This can be confusing for parents teachers and even clinicians This manual is meant to help clarify this distinction and will also assist you in figuring out how to seek help ask the right questions and what you can expect from early intervention services school based services and holistic therapeutic and psychiatric services
