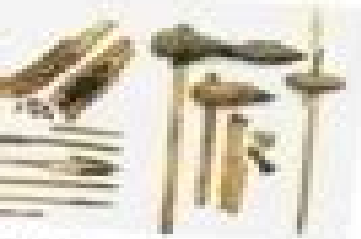

Today more than 120 million men, women, and children live in tribal societies in over 60 countries around the world. However, with logging, mining, and oil companies destroying tribal lands, it has become increasingly difficult for tribal people to maintain their livelihoods. International law has in place to protect land ownership and rights, however these are not always respected.

The highest concentration of uncontacted tribes are located in what is known as the Uncontacted Frontier on the borders of Peru, Brazil and Bolivia. The tribes include the Mursi, Matsigenka, Matsigenko-Pano, Hamar, Siriono and Ashuninka, and many more whose names are unknown. The people most noticeably known
