strategies for co evolution and in general the display of adaptive strategies of a microbial network as a response to the altered environment are of high interest While a special focus will be placed on terrestrial sole species or mixed biofilms we are also interested in aquatic systems biofilms in general and microbes living in symbiosis In this Research Topic we wish to summarize and review results investigating interactions and possibly networks between microbes of the same or different species their co occurrence as well as spatiotemporal patterns of distribution Our goal is to include a broad spectrum of experimental and theoretical contributions from research and review articles to hypothesis and theory aiming at understanding microbial interactions at a systems level
