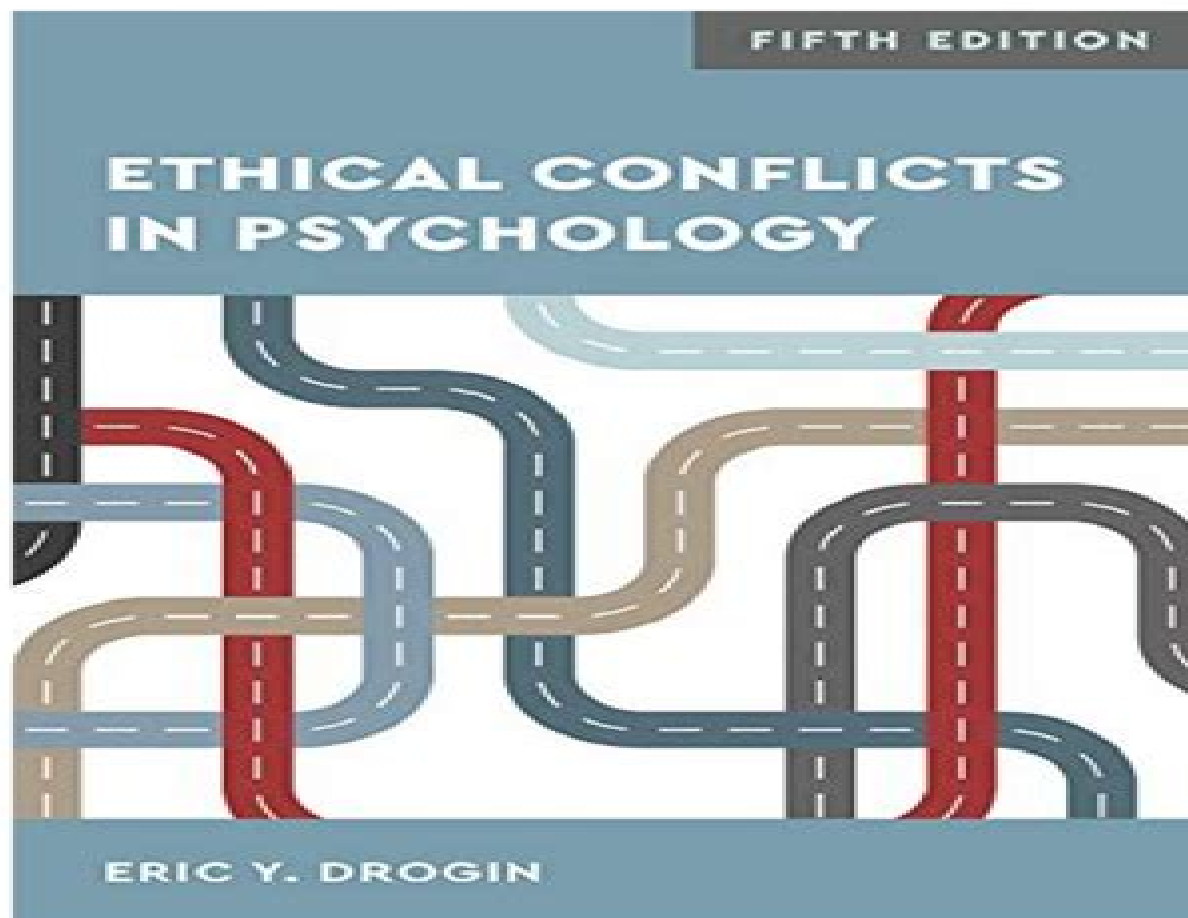

There are many psychological studies that appear to have been harmful or cruel to the people or animals that took part in them. Is this a reasonable thing to do to someone? Comparative psychologist Harry Harlow found that he could create severe and lasting distress in monkeys by keeping them in social isolation. Is this a reasonable thing to do even if we find out useful things about human distress? If you were able to use psychological techniques to break someone down so that they revealed information that was useful to your government, would you do it? If so, why? If not, why not? These ethical issues are not easy to resolve, and the debates continue as we encounter new dilemmas. This book uses examples from psychological research to look at key ethical issues, ethical guidelines of psychologists, socially sensitive research, ethics in applied psychology, the use of animals in research. This book is essential reading for undergraduate and pre-undergraduate students of psychology and related subjects such as philosophy and social policy.
