To add excitement, start with a bang!

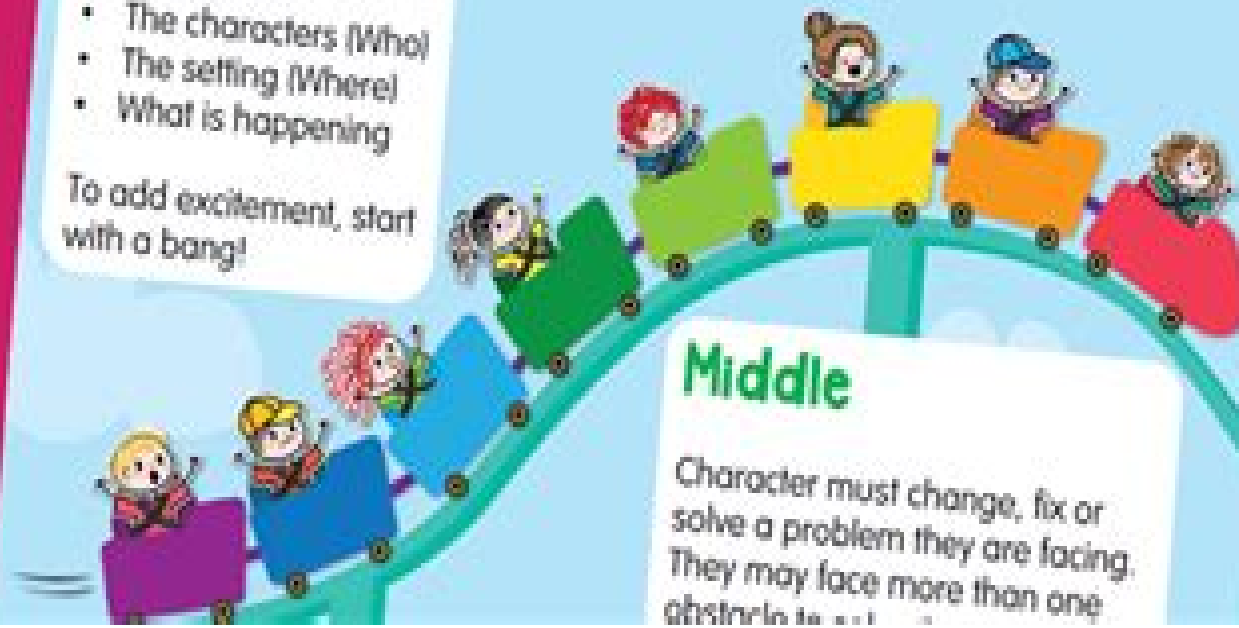
### End
