Political Morality in a Disenchanted World Edmund Abegg, 2013-06-20 Political morality concerns what programs and policies government ought to adopt What would this morality look like in a disenchanted world one in which rationality prevails The enchanted world is extensive including not just religion but traditional morality In this book Edmund Abegg constructs a coherent path that leads from abstract psychological and moral theory to ideal political and economic scenarios and then to their real world applications which for him are in terms of national political goals These goals individual autonomy and welfare function as political morality in this new framework in place of traditional mythical ideas such as justice Descriptive chapters on our current world indicate that these goals are in play if only partly Concerning these national moral political goals which may be domestic or international the crucial distinction he seeks to establish is between aggregated or big picture goals and individualized goals The latter are typically seen as establishing individual rights This book establishes a framework that clarifies important public policy issues in a way not possible if a jungle growth of myth envelopes our efforts with confusion and unnecessary controversies Beyond Moral Fundamentalism Steven Fesmire, 2024 Moral fundamentalism is the habit of acting as though one has access to the exclusively right way to diagnose problems along with the single approvable practical solution to any particular problem This approach causes us to oversimplify situations neglect broader context take refuge in dogmatic absolutes ignore possibilities for finding common ground assume privileged access to the right way to proceed and shut off honest inquiry In this way moral fundamentalism exacerbated by social media silos also makes the worst of native impulses toward social bonding and antagonism This makes it impossible to debate and achieve superordinate social goals such as public health justice security sustainability peace and democracy Drawing from John Dewey's pluralistic and pragmatic approach to philosophical questions Steven Fesmire develops an alternative to both the oversimplification of moral fundamentalism and the arbitrariness of relativism His pragmatic pluralism is set up as a response to particular conditions and consequences so it gains practical leverage with complex ethical political educational and policy problems without flattening variability among values or presuming that abstract theories can determine what we ought to do He argues that the reductive monistic premise that logically underlies moral fundamentalism is both unwarranted and constrictive and there is little to be said in favor of the grand philosophical quest for a unifying principle that cannot be accommodated within a wider pluralistic approach In a concrete and engaging style Fesmire clarifies and

illustrates the promises and challenges of democratic decision making in societies struggling to grow beyond moral fundamentalism

including on grounds of morality tradition family and community In our moral system the post Enlightenment Western moral system it is generally held that people should be entirely responsible for their own actions Indeed I would argue that if this principle does not hold our whole moral system would collapse Hence to be moral in the context of our code of morality is to be fully responsible for our own choices our own decisions and our own actions and to make sure that these don't result in negative outcomes especially on other people Our moral system places a particular emphasis on individual accountability and responsibility and for our moral system to work our culture and politics must support these notions clearly and to the fullest extent possible Furthermore the individualistic nature of Western morality means that whenever power is concentrated in a few hands those few people will exercise their power solely according to their own sense of morality not because it's their fault not because it's the system's fault but because it's what Western morality actually expects people to do In this situation there will inevitably be a lack of moral accountability which means a lack of moral responsibility The Moral Libertarian principle of Equal Moral Agency for every individual is a principle derived from the individual accountability requirements of the Western moral system and seeks to prevent lack of moral accountability It ensures as much as possible that nobody has moral agency over another person's actions and that every person can act according to their own moral agency This is where I believe the true heart of liberalism lies and it is why I say that liberalism is the best expression of morality as it is commonly agreed upon in our shared moral system Given our individualistic moral code I believe this is the only way to ensure morality is upheld Anything else would violate the basic assumptions of our moral code which would lead to deep confusion about what constitutes morality as interwar Europe under fascism had shown in a very disastrous way This book incorporates the best content from The Moral Libertarian Horizon Volumes 1 2 4 and 5 and is intended to provide a more complete picture on the Moral Libertarian philosophy
