What should the students know as a result of this lesson? The student should be able to: identify major endocrine glands within the body, describe relationships between hormones and homeostasis, perform calculations to determine heart rate, use appropriate microscope techniques, conduct research with multiple resources (e.g., Internet, reference books, etc.).
