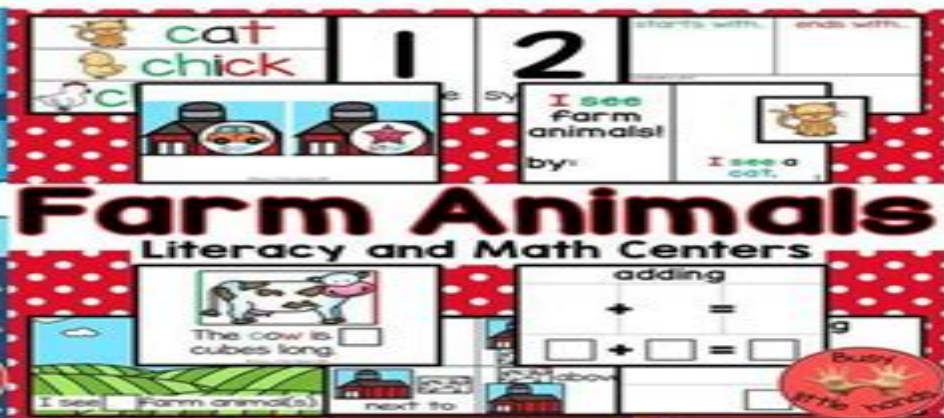
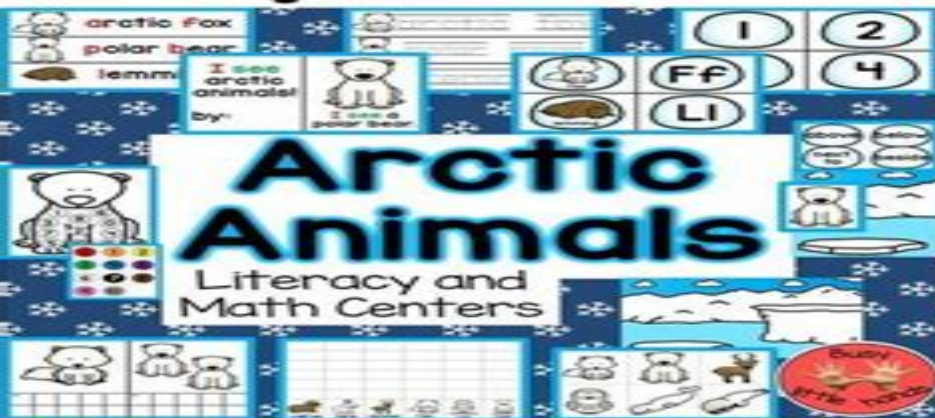

In *What Writing Does and How It Does It* editors Charles Bazerman and Paul Prior offer a sophisticated introduction to methods for understanding studying and analyzing texts and writing practices. This volume addresses a variety of approaches to analyzing texts and considers the processes of writing, exploring textual practices and their contexts, and examining what texts do and how texts mean rather than what they mean.
